STAGING OF EXHIBITS

Horticulture and Floral Art - all exhibits must be staged between 2.30pm and 8.30pm on Wednesday 26th August 2026. No entries will be allowed to stage on show day.

All other exhibits can be staged between 2.30pm and 8.30pm on Wednesday 26th August or between 7.00am and 8.30am on show day, Thursday 27th August. Any exhibits left overnight are at the exhibitor's risk.

All exhibitors need to enter via the Yellow entrance along the West Bay Road and will have 20 minutes to stage their exhibit before being asked to park in the Public car park.

EXHIBITOR NUMBERS

On arrival at your marquee please report to a steward to collect your exhibitor numbers. You will be issued with two sets of numbers. One must accompany your exhibit and the other should be retained as proof of ownership. Exhibits in the Home Produce and Handicrafts section must have the class label securely fastened to the exhibit. All Art and Photography exhibits must have the label attached at the front with Sellotape.

REMOVAL OF EXHIBITS

Exhibits must not be removed until 5pm and after the prize-giving presentations have taken place. From 6pm onwards admission to the Homecraft, Floral Art and Horticulture tents will be confined to exhibitors or their authorised representatives on production of the Exhibitors half of class labels affixed to exhibits, and will be allowed only for the purpose of collecting exhibits.

PRIZE MONEY

Winners will be presented with a prize money and this can be collected from the relevant marquee, you must present your winning class label in order to receive your card. Prize money is available to collect on the day or from our show office in Bridport up until 30th September 2026.

308	Top Vase Competition	<p>Top Vase Class is for a vase of mixed flowering stems containing a total of between five and 10 stems, taken from a minimum of two different kinds of plants. Please note that it is two different KINDS of plants; two varieties of the same plants are NOT two kinds. Only one entry per exhibitor please.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> · Only fresh, HOME-GROWN flowers can be used in the vase. No dried or silk flowers are allowed. · The display will be judged out of a total of 35 points, split into: 25 points for the colour, condition, quality and freshness of the flowers on display, and 10 marks for the overall presentation and effect of the flowers in the vase. The vase will be viewed from all directions. Judging of the flowers should be to the normal rules used for other classes. · Stems used in the display must be showing flowers only. No seed heads or berries will be allowed. · The vase can be any shape and size and made from any material, but must be in proportion to the display. No marks are awarded for the vase itself. · No accessories whatsoever - such as bows and additional foliage - will be allowed. Foliage which is growing naturally from the flowering stem, and still attached to that stem, is allowed. · The Winner of the Top Vase class will receive £10, 2nd £7.50 and 3rd £5 in vouchers from Washingpool Farm Shop. <p>NOTES FOR EXHIBITORS AND JUDGES</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> · Flowering stems can be taken from ANY flowering plant. · The different kinds of plants need to be taken from different genera. Eg. Pinks, carnations and sweet William, which are all dianthus - would not be classed as different kinds. · Only fresh, home-grown flowers can be used in the vase. No dried or silk flowers are allowed. · A vase, by definition, is any vessel that can be used to hold cut flowers and which is taller than it is wide at its widest point. · The Washingpool Top Vase class is open for anyone to enter and is not intended purely for growers who regularly display single species classes at shows. · Judges should note that the display has to be viewed all round. · The Points awarded should be clearly marked by judges on exhibitors' cards. · Any queries that may arise, regarding anything other than the above rules, should be referred to, and decided by, the Show officials. · Failure to abide by any of these rules will lead to disqualification.

Only one entry per exhibitor please.</p> <p>Each type of vegetable will be judged out of a total of 20 points. This is split into three sections as follows: 7 points for size, shape and colour; 7 points for condition; 6 points for uniformity. The overall mark therefore will be out of a total of 60.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> · All vegetables are to be displayed for effect. The vegetables must be displayed within an area measuring 45cm x 60cm (18 x 24) without bending any part of them. No part of any exhibit should exceed the size of the tray. · A tray or board measuring 45cm x 60cm (18 x 24) can be used to display the vegetables or the area can simply marked on the staging. Where a tray has a lip or edge it is the internal measurements that must not exceed 45cm x 60cm (18 x 24). NO BACKBOARD TO BE USED. · A black cloth is permitted, and the tray may be painted. Parsley is allowed for garnishing, but no other foliage, or accessories such as plates, sand or rings will be allowed.
